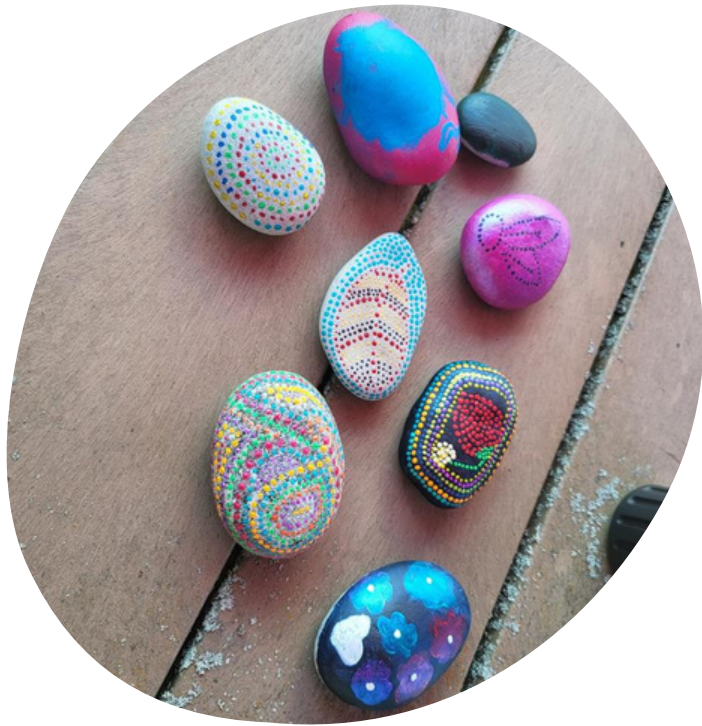

Being on the land, surrounded by Creation is fundamental to our well-being. Each Winter and Summer, we host On the Land Camps for children and youth to connect with the land, themselves and one another. The cover photo and the one to the left were taken at the On the Land Camp in August 2025. Children and youth expressed themselves through art, painting on rocks.

In addition to On the Land Camps, our Cultural Services team responded to **291 cultural referrals** by sharing **cultural teachings over 300 times**, hosting **171 hands-on artistry workshops** and **supporting 100 ceremonies**.

Our Circle Facilitators supported **nearly 900 children, youth and families** through **374 Circle Requests**.

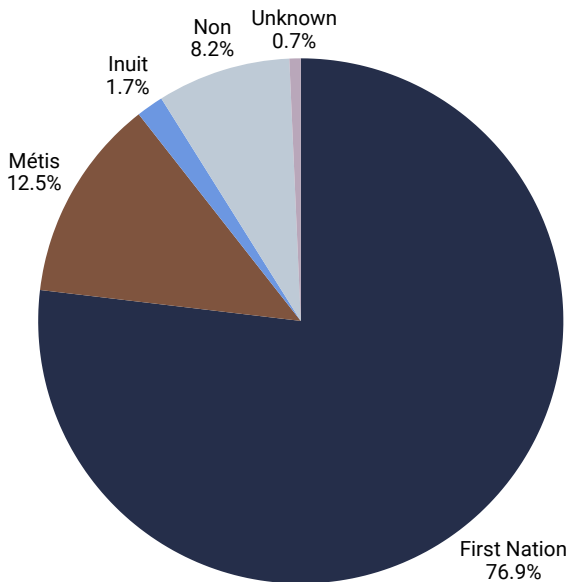

CHILDREN & YOUTH SERVED

Of the 712 children and youth served as of fiscal year end, 78% (552 total) identify as First Nation (status, non and mixed), just over 12% (90 total) identify as Métis (including mixed race) and under 2% (12 total) of those young people served identify as Inuk, 64 non-Indigenous and/or unknown.

At times, it is in the best interest of the children to serve the entire family who may be blended, some siblings identifying as Indigenous and others do not.

FIRST NATIONS JURISDICTION

Over the past year, the Ontario Final Agreement (OFA) was ratified by the Chiefs of Ontario (COO) on February 25, 2025 and approved by the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) on March 30, 2026. The OFA establishes new reporting requirements that are Nation-specific. To demonstrate just how complex the situation is, at year end, the 1,172 active services represented children, youth and families affiliated with 140 different First Nation, Inuit and Métis communities. There were also another 247 active services of families with unknown Indigenous affiliations who are supported by our family finders to explore ancestry.

ASSESSMENTS AND ONGOING

Of the 2,594 calls we received to initial assessment, 1,494 were further explored and 270 resulted in an ongoing case opening or reopening. Of important note, we received 285 referrals (19% of all assessments) from a child, parent or other family member including **61 self referrals** by a child or parent.

ALTERNATIVE CARE

The number of caregiver inquiries continues to decrease year over year. Recruitment of community-based homes continues to plague the child well-being sector. Of the 24 inquiries we saw during the fiscal year, one withdrew from the the process and three (3) were screened out. The remaining 20 inquiries transferred into the formal application process resulting in seven (7) home openings—the process continues into Fiscal Year 26-27.

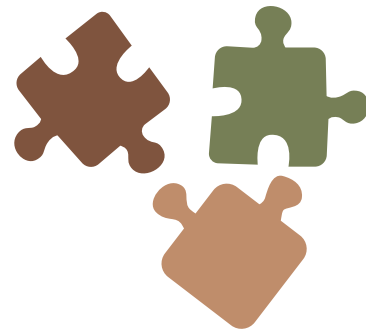


EDUCATION SUPPORTS

This fiscal year, our Education Liaisons support 213 children and secured **\$108,000 from the Transportation and Stability Fund** to support Indigenous children and youth in achieving positive educational outcomes. Of the children and youth supported, 31% required support to address learning differences.

SUPPORTING COMPLEX NEEDS

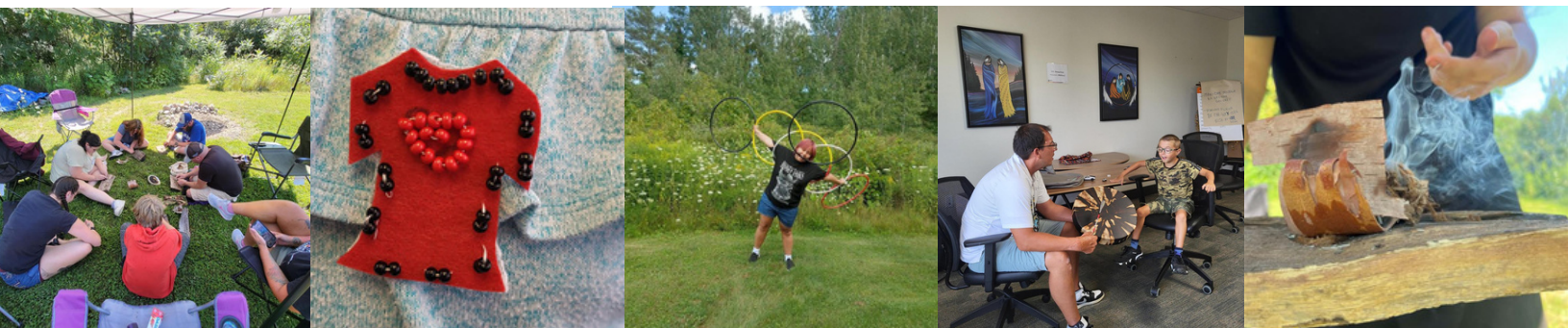
Our Urgent Response Service (URS) and Coordinated Service Planning (CSP) team **supported 210 children and youth with complex needs**, marking a 40% growth compared to year prior. These supports are vital in navigating systems and advocating for wholistic care.



FAMILY CONNECTIONS

The family connections team **supported 420 children** through geneological searches, family finding and community building. The team helped to enhance relational permanence for **35 children and youth**.

First Nations, Inuit and Métis ancestry was found and verified for **17 families** who previously had no known connections.

A five-year project to support participating agencies to use program evaluation data to inform service planning. We are piloting our Circle Facilitator program.

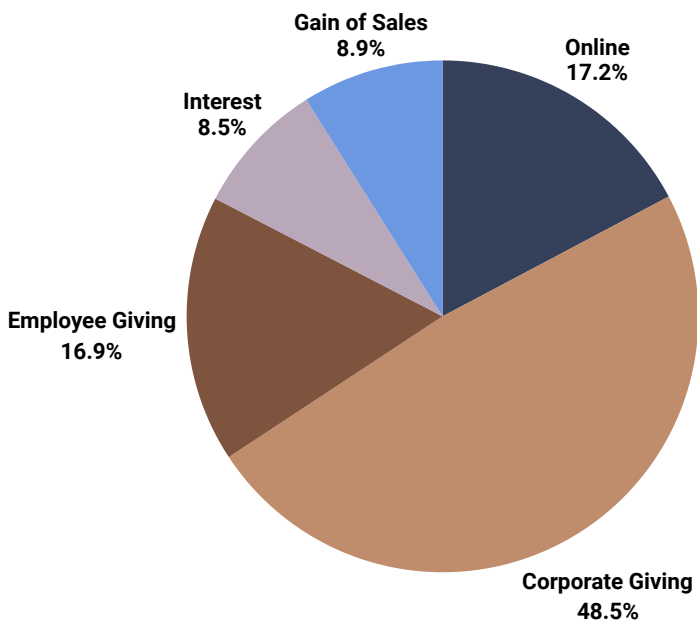

ENHANCING PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH



CHARITABLE DONATIONS

During the fiscal year, we received a total of \$44,418.05 in donations. Half of our donations came from local businesses and companies as part of their corporate giving. We attribute this recognition to our active involvement in the growing number of communities we serve.

Together individual and employee giving account for nearly a third of all donations.

CHARITABLE PROGRAMS

The Charitable Spending Review Committee, comprised of leadership, service, admin and a community member representative decide how and when to spend charitable dollars. This past fiscal, we expended our available funding (a total of \$30,797.89) on our Winter Solstice (holiday program) to alleviate some of the financial pressure the holidays bring so families can instead focus on spending time together creating memories. Additionally, we awarded six youth recipients with a \$2,811 bursary each to pursue their artistic interests. The Indigenous Youth Bursary is in memory of Rhiannon-baa Aird, a Service Supervisor who had a love for the arts.
